Keynote speech: Ina den Hollander



Ina was educated as a teacher in history and Dutch language. She worked in secondary education for 10 years as a teacher and projectmanager and moved to the adult education department of a Regional Educational Center as a teacher and curriculum developer of courses Dutch as a second language. Afterwards she was director at the department responsible for basic skills programs for low skilled adult second language learners and young dropouts.

In 2005 Ina moved to CINOP Consultancy. Her main topic as a CINOP Consultant are literacy and basic skills, adult education and civic integration. From 2005 to 2012 CINOP was one of the partners in the Dutch Action Plan on low literacy. Ina was one of the projectmanagers and worked on many projects in the field of awareness raising, the program for literacy ambassadors, and literacy and labor market issues. She worked as a qualitative researcher in a project defining several roles of volunteers in adult education.

In 2012 Ina was projectmanager in the project defining the Dutch national standards in basic skills education for language, numeracy and digital competences for the Dutch Ministry of Education, Culture and Science. She advised national and local authorities and regional educational centers in matters of adult education. In 2013 Ina was projectmanager of several projects from the Reading and Writing Foundation in the Language for Life program (development of assessments, digital portal for adult education). In 2014 she was co-author of a Handbook for Dutch municipalities implementing the new law on adult education.

Since 2012 Ina is the CINOP representative in two European Networks. She is member of EBSN and co-organiser of the last EBSN Annual Workshop, member of Team Adults in the ELINET network and writer of the country report on adults for this network. In 2015 Ina works as a consultant in the project of the National Coordinator Adult Education on behalf of the Ministry of OCW.

Bert- Jan is a senior consultant and managing partner at Ockham IPS. He was responsible for implementing more than 60 evaluation, consultancy and research projects for the European Commission, European Parliament, European agencies, ILO and UNESCO and different countries over the last 12 years. His experience covers the field of education and training, labour market, employment and regional policies, and specifically European territorial cooperation. He has a proven track record monitoring and evaluation EU programmes (such as ESF, ERDF, Erasmus+, and INTERREG), doing ex-ante, ongoing, and ex post evaluations, as well as impact assessments. He is Erasmus+ expert for the national agency of the Netherlands (2014 – current) and from 2011-2013 he was member of the thematic working group of the European Commission on quality in adult learning. He is current member of the expert group on quality adult learning within EPALE and is appointed ambassador for EPALE in the Netherlands. He has an academic background in Economic Geography.
